

EXTRACT FROM KELLYS 1891 STREET DIRECTORY OF SUSSEX

SHOREHAM

Shoreham is a seaport, comprising the parishes of New and Old Shoreham, situated at the mouth of the river Adur, and has a junction station of the Horsham branch with the coast line of the London, Brighton and South Coast railway, 56½ miles from London, 6 west from Brighton, 22 east from Chichester, 5 east from Worthing, in the Mid division of the county, Fishergate hundred, Brighton county court district, rape of Bramber, Steyning petty sessional division and union, rural deanery of Lewes (second division), archdeaconry of Lewes and diocese of Chichester; Shoreham formerly returned two members to Parliament, but under the provisions of the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," it was disfranchised. The Local Government Act was adopted on the 6th December, 1865, the board consisting of 12 members. The town is lighted with gas conveyed from Hove and is supplied with water by a company, from works situated at Old Shoreham, where there are two reservoirs, the higher one capable of holding 80,000 gallons and the lower 90,000. An elegant suspension bridge, carrying the road to Worthing over the river Adur, was erected in 1832 by the Duke of Norfolk. Old and New Shoreham are both on the Eastern bank of this river; the former, once a place of some importance, being half a mile north of the new town. Ella, the first king of the South Saxons, landed here to complete the conquest of England, and Charles II. made his escape from Shoreham to Fécamp after the battle of Worcester. A battery (No. 12) is placed at the mouth of the river. By an order dated August 9th, 1881, the limits of the port were defined as commencing at the eastern part of Rottingdean, being the western boundary of the port of Newhaven, and extending along the coast of Sussex in a westerly direction to the western part of Heene, being the eastern boundary of the port of Littlehampton.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin, New Shoreham, is part only of an ancient and beautiful cruciform structure, of which nearly the whole of the nave has been destroyed, and is an extremely interesting specimen of Transitional Norman architecture of flint and stone: it was formerly connected with a monastery, and consists of chancel of five bays with clerestory, one bay only of the nave, aisles, transepts and a lofty western tower containing a clock and 5 bells, three of which were

re-cast in 1667 and others in 1767: the clock, as appears from a brass plate thereon, was the gift of John Ferry esq. one of the burgesses of this borough, in 1690: the roofs are all groined and the inside walls are beautifully ornamented with the dog-tooth and zigzag patterns: there are piscinæ in both transepts: the only remaining bay of the nave has a three-light Perpendicular window; the main entrance, underneath the tower, is through a beautiful arch in the Transitional style, profusely decorated with the carving peculiar to that period: the east end is lighted by three lancet windows, surmounted by a wheel window, all filled with stained glass, as is the west window, together with the Norman windows in the chancel aisles and other parts of the church: on the chancel floor are brass effigies of a man and woman, each with the hands crossed upon the breast; another brass with arms, in the floor near the pulpit, bears the following inscription: "Heere lyeth interred the body of Walter West, of Woodman Cote, in the county of Svssex, esq. who married Elizabeth, the eldest daughter of Thomas Shirley, of Preston, in the county of Svssex, esq. who dyed Jvly the 18th, Ao. Dni. 1648, aged 23 yeares:" in the north chancel aisle is a brass tablet with an inscription recording the gift of £1,000 from T. Dyer Edwardes esq. with an account of the works therewith carried out in the church in 1876, including the new roofing of the south aisle and the erection of new doors and a pulpit of carved stone, under the direction of Mr. Arthur Loader, architect, of Brighton: more recently the church has been reseated with open oak benches and chairs affording 600 sittings. The register dates from the year 1566. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £24, gross yearly value £400, with residence, in the gift of Magdalen College, Oxford, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Charles Edward Steward M.A. formerly Demy of that college.

The church of St. Nicholas, Old Shoreham, is a cruciform building of flint with stone dressings, the fine arches in the tower and other features being of Norman date; it consists of chancel, transepts, nave, north chapel and a central tower containing one bell: under a canopy in the south wall of the chancel is a brass inscribed to Capt. Richard Poole, of this parish, ob. 17 Sept. 1652, and to Thomas, his only son, ob. 15 Nov. 1652; around is a decorated border

and at the top are the arms of the family, with the legend "Tvtamen devs:" near this is a piscina: the east window and others in the chancel are stained, and both the chancel and chapel are divided from the nave by screens of carved oak: the church was repaired in 1845, the expense being defrayed by the late Rev. W. Wheeler, assisted by the President and Fellows of Magdalen College, Oxford: there are 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1723. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, in the gift of Magdalen College, Oxford, and held since 1878 by the Rev. Henry Cadwallader Adams M.A. and late fellow Of that college.

The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Peter, is an edifice of flint with stone dressings, in the Gothic style of the 13th century, was opened in August, 1875, and consists of nave and a Lady chapel on the north side: the total cost, over £4,000, was defrayed by the Dowager Duchess of Norfolk: there are 200 sittings; the presbytery adjoining was completed in 1877.

The Wesleyan chapel, built in 1829, seats about 300 persons; the Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1879, has 400 sittings; the Particular Baptist chapel, built in 1880, 200; and the Countess of Huntingdon's chapel, 250.

The Baptist chapel, situated in the Western road, and built in 1880, at a cost, including the school, of about £1, 650, is an edifice of brick and flint, in the Italian style, with mouldings and dressings of Portland stone, and will seat 350

persons.

The trade of the port is chiefly in coals, corn and timber, and shipbuilding is also carried on. A fair is held on the 25th of July.

The No. 9 Battery of the 1st Sussex Volunteer Brigade, Eastern Division, Royal, Artillery, has its orderly room in High street.

The Swiss gardens, situated in Victoria road, were opened in 1838, and contain a large theatre holding 1,300 persons; a ball room 150 ft. long by 54 broad; a refreshment room fitted up for 1,000 persons; a museum and a conservatory: in the grounds, which are tastefully laid out, is a lake for boating and fishing.

Buckingham House, Old Shoreham, the property' of H. Bridger esq. J.P. but at present occupied by Henry Head esq. is a modern residence standing in pleasant grounds, a short distance north of the town. The Duke of Norfolk K.G. is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Harry Bridger esq. J.P. in Old Shoreham and the Rev. Robert Poole Hooper M.A. (of 31 Cambridge road, Brighton) in New Shoreham. The area of Old Shoreham is 1,919 acres of land and 52 of water; rateable value, £4,087; New Shoreham, 115 acres of land and 101 of water; rateable value, £10,143. The population in 1881 was, Old Shoreham, 248; New Shoreham, 3,438, including 234 officers and inmates in Steyning union workhouse.
